# **RYA Day Skipper Course**

After reading the excellent March 2023 edition of Channel 6, and in particular the great RYA Day Skipper article by Keith Butten, I thought I would contribute with my alternative experience.

I knew from personal experience of trying to complete the RYA VHF course at home, that NAVATHOME wouldn't work for me as my evenings are just too busy and I am not disciplined enough. I gave up on the home learning of the VHF course and only finally completed it after signing up for the excellent RYA 1 day VHF course organised by TWYC Training Principal Steve Worsdall, in early 2022 held in the clubhouse. *Thanks Steve!* 

I wanted to do my RYA Day Skipper course but knew I would need the discipline and commitment of the classroom environment.

So off I went in search for a shore based course and found one being run by Thames Motor Yacht Club, at Hampton Court.



The course ran from 7.30pm until 10pm every Wednesday evening for 6 months between September & March. This location suited me perfectly as I work in Twickenham and live in Crawley – it was 'kind of' on my way home! There were half term and Christmas breaks so it wasn't completely full on for 6 months.




I signed up and handed over my £500. In return you get all your books and charts to enable you to complete the course and all I had to buy was some pencils, dividers and a plotter.

The 6 months flew by almost in a blur! Philip was patient with the many stupid questions we as students had, and gently guided us through each segment of the Course.




















### **Boat Grub**



### Oriental pan-cooked pork Serves 4 - Contributor Helen Currie

4 tbs plum sauce, 1 tsp of soy sauce,, 8oz (225g) lean pork tenderloin, thinly sliced, 2 garlic cloves, crushed, 1 red chilli, finely sliced, 1 celery stick, cut into strips, 4oz (100g) pak choi, shredded or quartered lengthways (can substitute with Chinese leaf, shredded) 4 spring onions and salt & pepper to taste.

### **METHOD**

Mix the plum and soy sauce in a bowl. Dry fry the pork, garlic and chilli for 3-4 mins until brown. Add the remaining ingredients and cook for 1-2 minutes. Drizzle the plum & soy sauce and serve immediately with noodles or boiled rice.

### Air Fryer meals - Contributor Lorella Puccetti

Some of you have invested in an air fryer which is great on board for quick meals. Be careful of the power consumption of course.

### **Bang Bang Halloumi**

Halloumi is a nice cheese to keep on the boat as it has a long life.

Mix 2 tbs of each, mayonnaise, sweet chilli and siracha together.

(Siracha is a hot sauce)

Chop the halloumi into chunks and pat dry with kitchen towel.

Tip the halloumi into the sauce and mix to coat. Place in the air fryer tray and cook for 8 mins on 190 or until becoming slightly charred on the outside. Open the fryer

draw halfway through the cooking process and brush a little more sauce onto the cheese.

Serve with fresh salad and French bread for a delicious meal.

## The River We Cruise - contributor John Forsaith



### Windsor - Where something is one inch short

A short run from the Club through Boveney Lock takes your boat to Windsor. Whilst a very popular place to visit for boaters there are moorings to be had on both sides of the river. The left-hand bank going downstream is meadow. Watch out, the depth bankside varies, and you will need mooring pins. This mooring is quieter than the right bank, but will involve a walk down and over Eton Bridge to get to the town and shops.

The right- hand bank is busier, with many tourists on the pathways, hiring launches, buying ice creams plus hundreds of swans waiting to be fed. Town access is just a short walk, but don't expect an uninterrupted snooze on the back of your boat.

Hundreds of books have been written and documentaries made about the town, its history and connections with the monarchy. A very pleasant way to absorb its culture and history in comfort is to take one of the tour buses that operate from (Queen Victoria's statue) under the castle wall.

**The one inch short.** Sir Christopher Wren was appointed to build a replacement for the old Guildhall. His design featured columns around the outside of the building's floor. Local dignitaries insisted he add more columns to support the centre flooring. He provided more columns as instructed but they stop one inch short of the ceiling. He proved his point that they were not needed, and the building has survived since 1689. Walk under the Guildhall, look up to see daylight!





### Changing the guard at Windsor Castle

The Changing of the Guard ceremony takes place outside the castle gates and attracts thousands of spectators from around the world. "The Guard is founded by regiments drawn from the Army, Navy and Airforce and occasionally from the Commonwealth. Whilst their guns are not loaded they will, and do, take action to protect the Monarch. When they march, they will not stop!

The soldiers are accompanied by a band playing traditional military music (weather permitting), and the entire procession is a spectacular display of British tradition and pageantry.

On Tuesday's, Thursday and Saturday's soldiers and bands drawn from HM Forces at 11 a.m. march from their barracks up the high street then turn right into the castle by the above statue. Whist the ceremony is in progress the police close the street. The guard (the New Guard) march into the castle where the soldiers are allocated to their duties. If you wait a short time, you will see the Old Guard march out and back to their barracks. (Check the timings/dates on the web as there can occasionally be variations).

Whilst you are there, take time to visit **Windsor Castle** which is the oldest and largest occupied castle in the world. It is open to visitors throughout the year. Founded by William the Conqueror in the 11th century, it has since been the home of 40 monarchs.

# Skipper Advice Blog Items you may find useful to keep on-board



Some while ago I wrote a short article for Channel 6 about some of the items that we use aboard our boat. I thought it might be useful to do something similar again.

Over the years we have tried all sorts of products, with some proving rather better than others. Here's a selection that have worked really well for us:

Over the winter, a good **dehumidifier** is a must. We use a desiccant one draining straight into the galley sink. To save on the electric bill, we run ours on a **time switch** (which apparently isn't recommended) but some makes have an inbuilt timer. Not only does it keep any dampness at bay but it also produces a little bit of heat and air circulation. *Make sure you read the instruction book so that you do not extract too much moisture.* 







Whenever you need a torch the batteries are always flat and you can never find any working. We swapped to **USB rechargeable** versions and no longer suffer with that problem.

Over the winter we don't need to keep the boat warm but we do need to make sure it doesn't freeze. We have several **oil filled radiators** plugged into **thermostat plug sockets**. We set these at 2 or 3 degs so they only come on when there is a risk of freezing (the saving on electric compared with using the in-built frost-stat of the radiator will more than cover the cost of the plugs), We've also been experimenting with a **WiFi thermostat plug**. You can set a temperature for it to switch on and off or you can switch it remotely via WiFi. Not only can you see what the temperature is on the boat but it also proves that the 24ov is still on and working. We always keep cabin doors and wardrobes open to allow the air to circulate.





There are all sorts of hood cleaning chemicals out there but we haven't found one that really stands out. We generally now just use the same detergent that we wash the boat with. What we do use though is **MarineAGlaze Fabric Protector** to reproof the hood material. It comes in a hand pump spray that makes application very easy (especially on a slightly windy day). It's so much easier to apply than the tins of Fabsil/Renovo that we used to use and works very much better too.

It seems that everyone has their favourite fuel additives. We use **Startron Enzyme Fuel Treatment**. Whilst they all make many incredible claims, I do know that the Startron stopped our cold start smoking from first use. We've also used a couple of other additives that claim to prevent water contamination in stored fuel. We currently use **ElimiNOX Eco** and didn't suffer from any "bug" problems when the boat was hardly used between 2020 and this year.



Don't forget **puppy pads**! They're super absorbent and great for dealing with oil and water in the bottom of the bilge (or anywhere else in the boat for that matter). You can stick them down under an engine, cut them up for smaller spills and they're thin enough to slide into tight spaces too. The uses are many and they're inexpensive too.

# Skipper Advice Blog Items you may find useful to keep on-board cont....

CleanToGleam Boat Interior Cleaner is fantastic for cleaning helm upholstery.

Occasionally spider poo needs a bit more effort, but day to day dirt and grime cleans easily away. CleanToGleam can also supply three grades of very expensive sponges. They do seem expensive but work well and last far better than any "Magic" others that we have tried (we tend to keep some cheap melamine magic sponges on-board too)



We always keep a healthy stock of **Costco yellow microfibre clothes**. They're excellent value, machine washable, last for years and can be used for all manner of things (inc wrapping around squeaky mooring lines!) We've switched (!) to a fantastic new electric outboard but if you still have a petrol one here's a couple of tricks to keep you running. Fuel seems to be the biggest problem with tender outboards - it clogs the carburettor and "goes off" over time. Firstly, opt for super-unleaded E5 which has less bio-ethanol in it. Also we used, with great effect, **Briggs and Stratton Fuel Fit.** It will increase the shelf-life of your fuel and generally keep your fuel system cleaner too.



You can't talk boats without mention of the toilet! When we leave the boat we pour some **white vinegar** in to the bowl and give a quick flush. The idea being that the limescale removing properties of the vinegar will keep all the pipes clear and free flowing. So far so good!





If you have ever left the boat with the fridge turned off and the door closed you'll certainly appreciate a bottle of **Milton Anti-Bacterial Surface Spray**. A few squeezes of the trigger and a careful wipe around with a trusty Costco cloth and everything will be sweet smelling and safe to use again.

And don't let green "stuff" grow on your boat over the winter - use **Wet & Forget** in a garden pressure sprayer to kill it off. It works on the GRP, the hood and round the windows. We buy a 5lt container and dilute accordingly.





**3M Perfect-it Gelcoat Medium Compound Polish & Wax** removes oxidation on your fibreglass, polishes it and at the same time adds a layer of wax. No need for separate cutting agents, polishes and waxes - just one pot does it all! I tend to use a machine polisher and apply the polish (slightly watered down) with a damp sponge. It's great on fenders too! To keep that lovely shine all season I always use a good quality wash/wax when washing the boat (my favourite is **ZIP Wax by Turtle**). Whatever you do, don't use Fairy liquid as it strips all the polish off.




# Skipper Advice Blog Items you may find useful to keep on-board cont...

A **rechargeable window vacuum cleaner** is great for all the windows, especially when the inside of the windscreen mists up. We tried an expensive Karcher one but found a much cheaper version on eBay with an extension pole much better. Not only does the extension pole allow you to reach the whole windscreen, but it also works upside down (unlike the Karcher).





As to our actual vacuum cleaner, we used to have a very good wired Panasonic vac. It was small enough to stow easily and the cable retracted inside. However, you still needed to get it out from under the floor, plug it in (start the genny if not in the marina) etc etc. We now have a **rechargeable Dyson**. It may have been expensive but it is so easy to use that it does get used a lot. And whenever we're plugged into 240v it gets a charge too.





I've used several dinghy cleaners but the one I have just used is by far the best. I don't recall where I bought it but it's called **RIB Revive**. Spray it on and leave for a short while. I then used a magic sponge followed by a damp microfibre cloth. Absolutely Amazing! There's also a conditioner cream that you can wipe on afterwards to help protect the tubes.

On a slightly different subject, we keep a steel **cable and decent padlock** on-board. We often use it to pass through a cleat and then through a mooring ring. We've all heard stories of boats on the Thames being cast adrift. Hopefully, the average moron that does such things doesn't carry bolt cutters too. Obviously you can't do this everywhere, but when you can, I think the chances are that your boat will still be moored where you expect it to be.

When it's next time to renew our antifouling we're seriously considering **Finsulate**. Their website says "Traditional antifouling paints are highly toxic and very harmful to the environment. Finsulate offers an environmental friendly solution to the fouling challenge. Nature is a source of technological developments in many cases. For Finsulate, the spines of the Sea Urchin were the inspiration. Rik Breur was elected European Inventor of the Year in 2019 with this concept". Check out their website for full details and read about this very intriguing alternative to traditional paint-on antifoul that also comes with a 5-year warranty.

# Skipper Advice Blog - Winterizing Boats

### Don't let your boat get stuck out in the cold.

If you have not already completed your winter checks, here are a few useful tips:



Diesel engines may seem complicated and costly but it is absolutely vital for safety and enjoyment that you have at least a little understanding of how it works and what to do if it fails.

- Fill your fuel tank to the brim to prevent condensation, this in turn prevents the growth of diesel bugs.
- Use fuel treatment to kill off any diesel bug that might already be in the tank.
- Change the engine oil and replace the oil filters. Leaving the old oil contaminated with the acidic by-products of combustion inside the engine block will shorten the engine's life. A neglected oil system can cause expensive damage.
- Check that the engine has sufficient anti-freeze content to prevent freezing.
- If anodes are fitted in your engine, check and replace if over 1/3 worn away.
- If there is going to be a big freeze, empty your drinking water tank by running the tap until water stops flowing, then turn off the water pump at the switch to prevent it running dry. If possible undo a fitting at the lowest part of the fresh water system to ensure little or no water is left in the pipes.

  If the water freezes it can crack pipes and fittings.
- Whilst your boat is ashore, check the gearbox or outdrive oil and replace if it looks cloudy or milky.
   Milky oil means water has got in, deal with it immediately!
- Most marine diesel engines use sea or river water to cool heat exchangers on the engine which need attention when winterising.

Sea water will not freeze in our climate but river water can. You can prevent this by shutting off the main seacock and pouring a strong antifreeze/water 50/50 mix solution into the water strainer with the engine running and stopping the engine immediately it had consumed enough to fill the system. I generally use about 12 litres. ONLY DO THIS IF YOU ARE CONFIDENT AND COMPETENT! If in doubt, ask!







# Skipper Advice Blog - Winterizing Boats cont...

- If you are leaving your boat in the water over the winter, consider turning off all seacocks, leave yourself a note at the helm so you don't forget to turn them on next season!
- To help keep the engine compartment temperature up, stuffing the air intake with rags will help to prevent cold draughts. Remember to remove them when re-commissioning!
- If possible leave batteries fully charged or topped up at least every four to six weeks. Batteries left uncharged for long periods may need to be replaced whilst completely full batteries are less likely to freeze in sub-zero temperatures. Turn off the main switches to disconnect the batteries from the rest of the electrical system and clean and grease the terminals.



- If your vessel is chocked up ashore, make sure the boat is angled slightly bow upwards to enable rain water to run off immediately from covers, decks and cockpit. Covers should keep water out but allow air to circulate. Proper through-draught will prevent condensation which leads to dry rot, mould and corrosion - especially if left for more than a single season.
- Store all linen, clothing, blankets, curtains, etc. ashore.
- Prop the fridge and freezer door open mould will form in less than a week if left closed. Ensure through-ventilation.
- Leave cupboards and drawers open; prop up bunk cushions, leave under-berth locker lids open.
- Get circulation into every possible nook and cranny.
- If you have shore power, a dehumidifier is always recommended to remove excessive moisture but make
- sure it is draining into a sink.
- Always a good idea to run greenhouse tube heaters especially in the engine bay connected to a plug-in
- Thermostat set at 5C.

14) - The ocean is made up of water and fish. Why the fish don't drown I don't know.




